Report on review of condensed interim financial information

To the Unitholders and Fund Manager of
Al-Badr Murabaha Fund - US Dollars

Introduction

We have reviewed the accompanying condensed interim statement of financial position of Al-Badr Murabaha Fund - US Dollars (the "Fund") as of 30 June 2023 and the related condensed interim statements of comprehensive income, changes in equity attributable to the Unitholders and cash flows for the six-month period then ended and other explanatory notes. Fund Manager is responsible for the preparation and presentation of this condensed interim financial information in accordance with International Accounting Standard 34 - *"Interim Financial Reporting" (IAS 34)*, as endorsed in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on this condensed interim financial information based on our review.

Scope of review

We conducted our review in accordance with International Standard on Review Engagements 2410, *"Review of interim financial information performed by the independent auditor of the entity"*, as endorsed in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. A review of interim financial information consists of making inquiries, primarily of persons responsible for financial and accounting matters, and applying analytical and other review procedures. A review is substantially less in scope than an audit conducted in accordance with International Standards on Auditing, as endorsed in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, and consequently does not enable us to obtain assurance that we would become aware of all significant matters that might be identified in an audit. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion.

Conclusion

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the accompanying condensed interim financial information is not prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with IAS 34, as endorsed in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

1. GENERAL

Al-Badr Murabaha Fund - US Dollars (the “Fund”) is an open-ended Shariah compliant investment fund established based on an agreement between Saudi Fransi Capital Company (the “Fund Manager”) and investors (the “Unitholders”). The Fund commenced its operations on 14 Rabi’ Al Thani 1418H (corresponding to 18 August 1997).

The objective of the Fund is to provide capital preservation and liquidity. The Fund invests in Shariah compliant debt instruments.

During the period, the Fund has updated its terms and condition which have been approved by the Capital Market Authority (“CMA”) 21 Shawwal 1444H (corresponding to 11 May 2023).

The Fund Manager and Administrator of the Fund is Saudi Fransi Capital Company. The Custodian of the Fund is HSBC Saudi Arabia.

2. REGULATORY AUTHORITY

The Fund is governed by the Investment Fund Regulations (the “Regulations”) issued by the CMA on 3 Dhul Hijja 1427H (corresponding to 24 December 2006) and amended by resolution of the Board of the CMA on 12 Rajab 1442H (corresponding to 24 February 2021) effective from 19 Ramadan 1442H (corresponding 1 May 2021) by the New Investment Fund Regulations (“Amended Regulations”) published by the CMA on 17 Rajab 1442H (corresponding to 1 March 2021) in addition to the new amendment number 2-22-2021 issued on 12 Rajab 1442H (Corresponding to 24 February 2021) detailing requirements for all funds within the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

3. BASIS OF PREPARATION

3.1 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

This condensed interim financial information has been prepared in accordance with International Accounting Standard 34 “Interim Financial Reporting”, as endorsed in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia and other standards and pronouncements as issued by the Saudi Organization for Chartered and Professional Accountants (SOCPA).

This condensed interim financial information does not include all the information and disclosures required in the annual financial statements; therefore, this should be read in conjunction with the Fund’s annual audited financial statements as at and for the year ended 31 December 2022. The results for the six-month period ended 30 June 2023 are not necessarily indicative of the results that may be expected for the financial year ending 31 December 2023.

Assets and liabilities in the condensed interim statement of financial position are presented in the order of liquidity.

3.2 BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

This condensed interim financial information is prepared under the historical cost convention, using the accrual basis of accounting except for investment held at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL) that are measured at fair value.

3.3 FUNCTIONAL CURRENCY

This condensed interim financial information is presented in United States Dollar (“USD”), which is the Fund’s functional and presentation currency.

4. ACCOUNTING AND RISK MANAGEMENT POLICIES

The accounting and risk management policies used in the preparation of this condensed interim financial information are consistent with those used and disclosed in the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2022, unless otherwise mentioned in Note 6 to this condensed interim financial information.

5. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS

The preparation of the condensed interim financial information requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected. The significant accounting estimates and assumptions used in the preparation of this condensed interim financial information are consistent with those used in the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2022.

Going concern

The Fund Manager made an assessment of the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that the Fund has the resources to continue in business for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, the management is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt about the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern. Therefore, this condensed interim financial information continues to be prepared on the going concern basis.

6. NEW STANDARDS, INTERPRETATIONS AND AMENDMENTS

New standards, interpretations and amendments adopted by the Fund

The International Accounting Standard Board (IASB) has issued following accounting standards, amendments, which were effective from periods on or after 1 January 2023. Fund Manager has assessed that the amendments have no impact on the Fund's financial statements.

- IFRS 17, 'Insurance contracts' – This standard replaces IFRS 4, which permits a wide variety of practices in accounting for insurance contracts.
- Narrow scope amendments to IAS 1, Practice statement 2 and IAS 8 - The amendments aim to improve accounting policy disclosures and to help users of the financial statements to distinguish between changes in accounting estimates and changes in accounting policies.
- Amendment to IAS 12 – deferred tax related to assets and liabilities arising from a single transaction - requires companies to recognise deferred tax on transactions that, on initial recognition, give rise to equal amounts of taxable and deductible temporary differences.
- Amendment to IAS 12 - International tax reform - pillar two model rules - These amendments give companies temporary relief from accounting for deferred taxes arising from the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development's (OECD) international tax reform. The amendments also introduce targeted disclosure requirements for affected companies.

The Fund Manager has conducted a review as required under IFRS 9. Based on the assessment, the Fund Manager believes that there is no significant expected credit loss against the carrying value of net investment measured at amortised cost at the reporting date.

10. TRANSACTIONS AND BALANCES WITH RELATED PARTIES

Parties are considered to be related if one party has the ability to control the other party or exercise significant influence over the other party in making financial or operational decisions. In considering each possible related party relationship, attention is directed to the substance of the relationship, not merely the legal form.

Related parties include Saudi Fransi Capital Company (“the Fund Manager”), Banque Saudi Fransi (the Bank and the shareholder of the Fund Manager), the Funds’ Board of Directors (BOD), affiliates of the Fund Manager, the Funds managed by the Fund Manager and the Unitholders of the Fund.

In the ordinary course of its activities, the Fund transacts business with related parties.

The Fund pays the Fund Manager a management fee calculated at an annual rate of up to 0.5% (2022: 0.5%) per annum plus applicable taxes calculated on the total net assets value on daily basis. The fee is intended to compensate the Fund Manager for administration and management of the Fund.

Subscription fee up to 3 percent of the invested amount is adjusted by deduction from the gross subscription, hence, it does not affect or reflect in the financial statements of the Fund.

11. FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or liability the principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible to the Fund.

The Fund uses the following hierarchy for determining and disclosing the fair value of financial instruments:

Level 1: quoted market price: financial instruments with quoted unadjusted prices for identical instruments in active markets.

Level 2: quoted prices in active markets for similar assets and liabilities or other valuation techniques for which all significant inputs are based on observable market data.

Level 3: valuation techniques for which any significant input is not based on observable market data.

The Fund's financial assets consist of cash and cash equivalents, investments held at FVTPL, investments held at amortised cost and other assets. The Fund's financial liabilities consist of management fee payable, payable against units redeemed and accruals and other liabilities.

The following table shows the carrying amount and fair values of financial assets and financial liabilities, including their levels in the fair value hierarchy for financial instruments measured at fair value. It does not include fair value information for financial assets and financial liabilities not measured at fair value as the carrying amount is a reasonable approximation of fair value. The fair value of investments measured at FVTPL are based on quoted prices in active markets and are therefore classified within Level 1.
